Martha's Community Farm: Finding God in the Dirt

Martha's Community Farm is a hidden treasure.

Natives of the Philadelphia region have likely heard of St. Gabriel's Hall in Audubon and the good works done there from its opening in 1898 until its closure in 2020. Following that closure, Martha's Choice Marketplace acquired the use of the 9-acre farm on the property (previously the Mitchell program) and began to grow produce for its food pantry community.

When it was still open, a portion of the grounds at St. Gabriel's Hall hosted the Mitchell Program, an animal husbandry therapy program for adjudicated youth.

Alongside teachers and therapists, many young men found healing while working with animals. Martha's Community Farm operates on these same grounds, breathing new life into the powerful healing legacy accomplished there for over 100 years.

Led by Jesse Antonini, the Martha's team of volunteers, staff, and partners began converting the animal enclosures and fields into crop production for guests of our food pantry in Norristown, the largest and most visited food pantry in Montgomery County. In our first year, the farm produced 5,000 pounds of nutritious food for the pantry, specifically foods desired by the pantry's Hispanic and Latino population. Now, with full irrigation, comprehensive fencing, a renovated green house, new farm equipment, and a strong core of volunteers, staff, and network of partners, the farm is positioned to continue the robust trajectory of growth it has seen over the last three years. Last year, the farm produced over 18,000 pounds of food for Martha's Choice Marketplace.

We are a regenerative farm that uses no pesticides. We strive to create a balanced, native environment where we can cooperate with nature to manage the pest and disease pressures of the farm. This is most notably visible in our food forest—a cultivated space of 360 native, primarily food-bearing trees. This dynamic ecosystem has been carefully selected to create habitat for beneficial wildlife and bear food for years to come.

Most Reverend John J. McIntyre Presides at Blessing of Youth Skills Building Program, a New Ministry for Philadelphia Youth



At a special ceremony in June, Catholic Social Services (CSS) blessed the Youth Skills Building Program (YSBP), a new after-school ministry in South Philadelphia.

Most Reverend John J. McIntyre, an Auxiliary Bishop of Philadelphia who oversees the Secretariat for Catholic Human Services (CHS) as part of his administrative and pastoral responsibilities, presided over the blessing.

He was joined by Mrs. Heather Huot, Secretary for CHS; Dr. James Black, Director of CSS' Youth Services Division; Kimberly Ali, Philadelphia Department of Human Services (DHS) Commissioner; members of the CSS Board of Directors; local government officials; staff members from the program; and community supporters.

Funded by DHS to engage youth and help keep them safe, YSBP is a new after-school ministry of CSS' Youth Services Division. The trade education program launched in May 2024, aiming to reduce risk factors for Philadelphia youth aged 13-18. It plans to serve 24 young people in its first year of operation.

YSBP provides youth with the opportunity to acquire new skills including carpentry and home repair. Program participants will use their newly learned skills to repair vandalized homes throughout the City. In addition, the program offers members transportation, meals, and a weekly stipend. The YSBP building development involved rehabilitating the former Saint Gabriel Parish Elementary School in Grays Ferry.

Norris Square Senior Community Center Performs at Wawa Welcome America/Hispanic Fiesta 2024







Saint Hubert's High School Hosts Northeast OST for STEAM Workshops

For more than 20 years, Catholic Social Services (CSS) has served children and youth through its Out-of-School Time (OST) programs.

OST's school-based community centers offer a variety of creative after-school activities in the late afternoon aimed at youth development and family support. Operating during the school year and throughout the summer, OST provides safe, challenging, and engaging learning experiences that help children develop social, emotional, physical and academic skills.

The afterschool initiative also provides programs that focus on science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM) education.

For the second year in a row, Northeast's OST students traveled to Saint Hubert Catholic High School for Girls for a STEAM workshop series. The two-day event was hosted by the school's Bambie Botz Robotics Team.

Northeast OST youth had the opportunity to learn more about robotics and participated in workshops designed by the Saint Hubert's students themselves. The children built their own "bubble bots" before getting the chance to operate the "Bambie Bot", a robot crafted by the club for competition in the 2023-2024 robotics competition season.



Kara Wisniewski, Northeast OST Director, and Jo Bradley, High School OST Director, enjoy collaborating on these programs.

"I absolutely love seeing what the Saint Hubert's students come up with for hosting these events," said Bradley. "I help with breaking it down to age-appropriate steps, but the team is tasked with all the components of the workshops. The robot party is always a fun day."

The duo works together to identify different ways for the high school students to work with the younger neighborhood youth, aiming to build mentor connections and youth-led events.

Nutritional Development Services Collects Over 75,000 Pounds in Manna Sunday Drive

Nutritional Development Services (NDS) wrapped up its annual Manna Sunday food drive and collected over 75,000 pounds of non-perishable food items! This year, 70 parishes in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia participated in the drive. The donations will benefit individuals and families facing hunger and food insecurity throughout the five-county region.

For over 45 years, NDS has hosted its Manna Sunday food drive. It is named after the edible substance God provided for the Israelites in the desert. Manna Sunday prepares NDS for the "desert" of the summer months when donations at its food pantries historically drop to low levels.



"The Manna Food Drive has helped to sustain the Patrician Society's emergency food cupboard for more than two decades. As many as 13 churches have supported our cupboard in any one year. We work with approximately 2,000 unique families all through the year and the Manna Food Drive is a timely godsend in helping us to keep our pantry supplied through the summer months."

Welcomes Newcomers

To mark World Refugee Day (WRD), Catholic Social Services (CSS) partnered with Bethany Christian Services, HIAS Pennsylvania, Nationalities Service Center, and the City of Philadelphia's Office of Immigrant Affairs for an event at the BOK Building in South Philadelphia.

The day included an informational panel featuring individuals with professional and lived refugee experiences and a showing of "The Elephants and the Grass," a documentary following the journey of a Sudanese mother and daughter fleeing civil war.

WRD is an international celebration organized by the United Nations to celebrate and honor refugees from around the world. The day underscores the plight of migrants and refugees around the world who are displaced due to war, famine, or political unrest in their countries of origin. It is also a call to action for people everywhere to welcome refugees into their communities and help them to assimilate to their new homes.

Ahead of WRD, Pope Francis emphasized this importance by saying, "We are all called to welcome, promote, accompany, and integrate those who knock on our doors."



CSS provides comprehensive assistance to refugees, evacuees, and asylum seekers emigrating to the United States and specifically to the Philadelphia region. Services provided include housing resources, assistance with benefits, employment searches, cultural orientation, and connection to mental health resources.

In May, CSS hosted its annual welcome luncheon for newly arrived individuals and families through its Immigration Service Programs. Around 100 guests were in attendance including approximately 80 newcomers as well as program supporters and volunteers.

Kathy Bevenour, Assistant Director of CSS Community-Based Services Division, was one of several CSS staff members present to connect families to various resources.

"The Welcome Luncheon held every year by Catholic Social Services is a celebration of the amazing strides newly arrived immigrants have made in the past year as they have resettled their families in Philadelphia," said Bevenour. "The celebratory event included fare from all home countries of the peoples represented, resources and clothing items for families to take with them, activities for the children, gifts for everyone in attendance, and blessings and encouragement for attendees as they continue on their resettlement journey."
